### Proposed Executive Budget (2015-16)

- Increases bonding to \$1.3 BILLION
- \$1.46 billion for big-ticket highway projects
  - \$623 million for *Southeast Wisconsin Megaprojects*
  - \$836 million for *Major Highway Projects*
- \$3.41 billion in state highway maintenance
- \$2.6 billion for local reimbursements

The proposed 2015-17 biennial transportation budget recommends increasing bonding for transportation to a total of \$1.3 billion for the next two years, while failing to address crucial transportation needs—particularly at the local level.

We need a more responsible alternative.

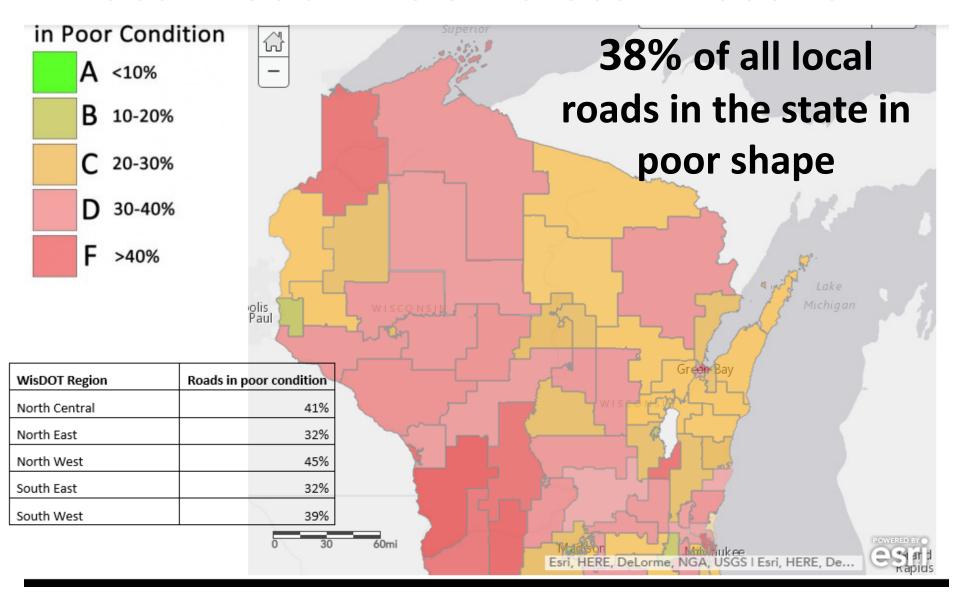

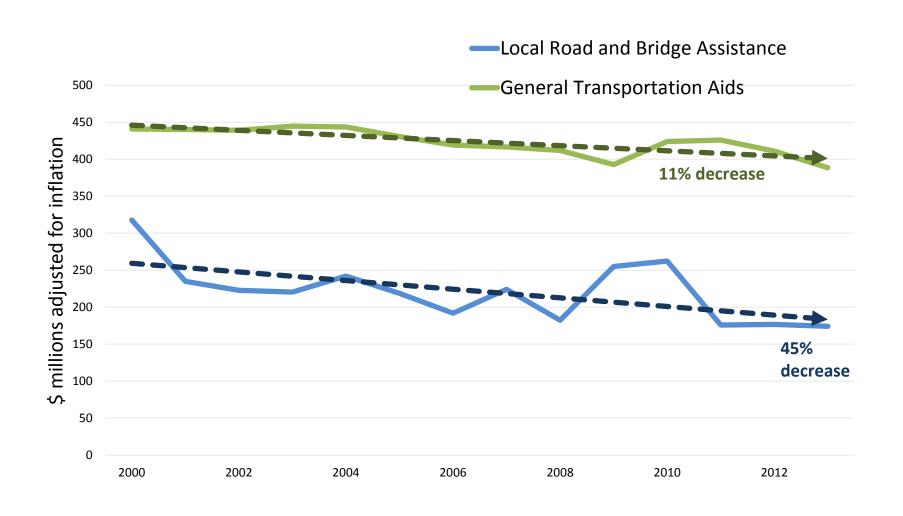

### Public Transit Systems Hurt by **10%** Cut in 2012

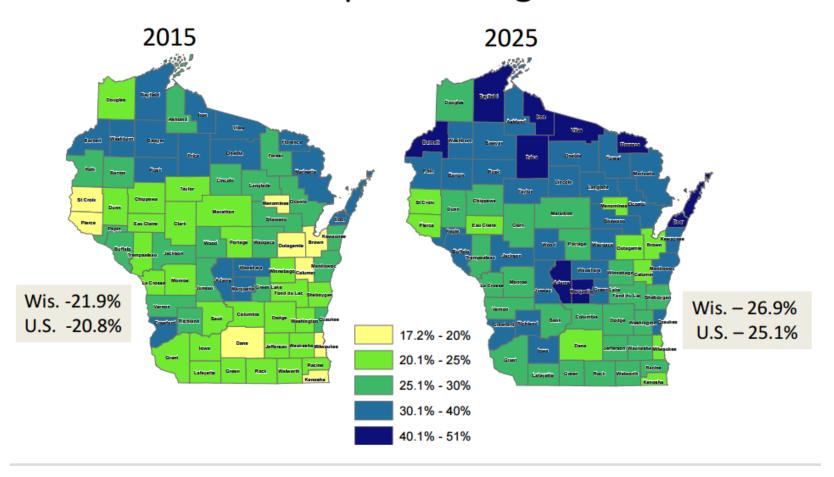
 Demand for efficient transit remains high in the state – but persistent cuts make it hard to provide high quality service.

• In Milwaukee, cuts have resulted in 22% fewer annual bus miles between 2000 and 2012.

 Transit systems are not connecting workers to jobs, hurting the economy.

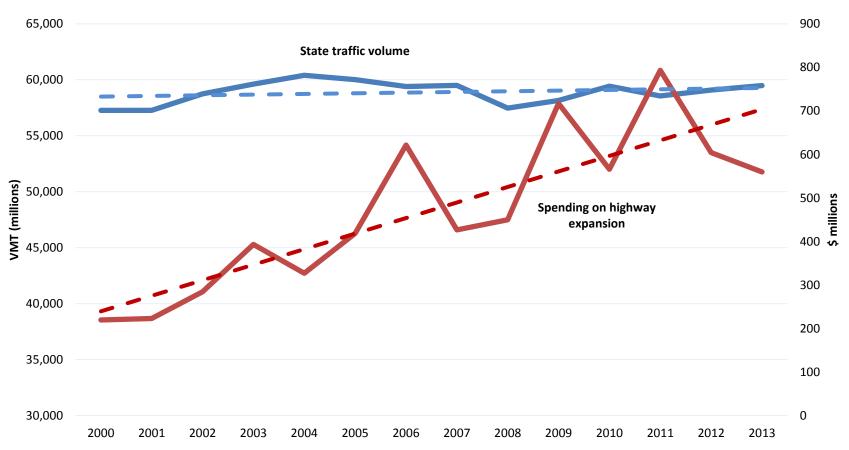

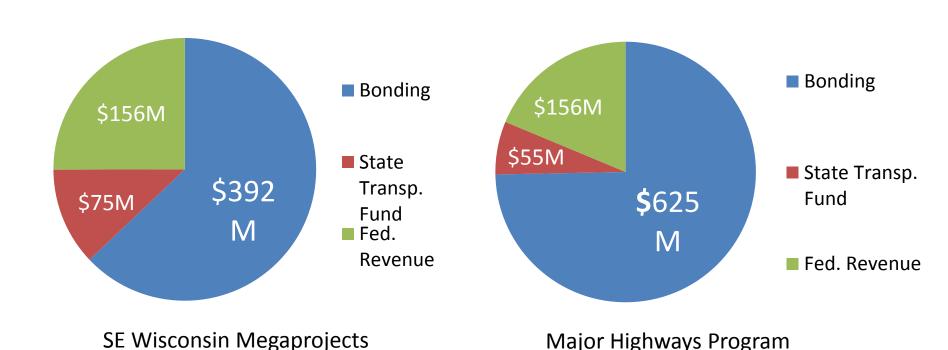
### \$1.459 Billion in Highway Expansion in Proposed State Budget

Traffic has been declining across the state since 2005. However, spending on highway expansion has been going up.



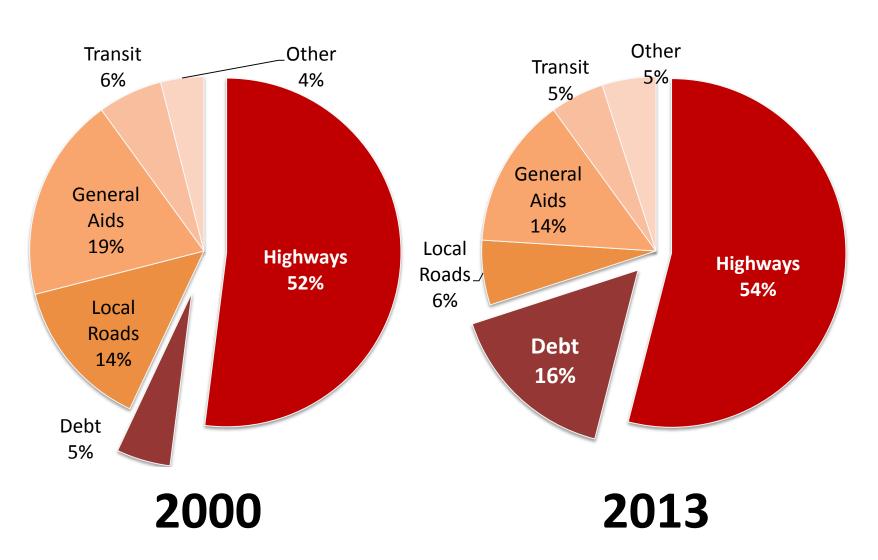
### Highway Projects Drive Increase in Transportation Debt

State Highway 50	<b>+103%</b> (2011-2040 <b>)</b>	<b>+13%</b> (2002-2011)
State Highway 15	<b>+61.2%</b> (2007-2040)	<b>-22.9%</b> (2000-2010)
State Highway 23	<b>+54.5%</b> (2014-2040)	<b>-4.9%</b> (2000-2014)
I-90 to IL Border	+29% (2000 - 2010)	+1% (2000-2012)
